Thanks to you, EPES' educational and outreach activities reach over 180,000 individuals in poor communities every year, at a cost of barely \$2 per person reached.

Thanks to you, EPES health promoters and shantytown health teams have:

- cared for sick neighbors
- run workshops for local residents on teen pregnancy, HIV/AIDS, domestic violence, breast cancer and more
- worked on city wide coalitions against violence against women
- led coalitions to eradicate illegal dumps
- presented policy proposals at local, national and international meetings
- written books and gone to college

I am writing to you now to ask you to help us with a special year-end gift so that EPES can continue empowering individuals and communities and leading the struggle for health and dignity in Chile and Latin America.

Highlights of EPES in 2008

Concepción, practice first aid in a course led

by EPES entitled "Sharing and Refreshing Our

Knowledge."

In 2008, EPES expanded its work throughout Chile carrying out health education workshops in the far northern city of Iquique as well as in Santiago, Rancagua, Concepción and far to the south in Osorno. Here are some of the highlights of the year:

- On an international level, EPES is working with three other institutions from Brazil, Argentina and Uruguay on a project that addresses the intersection of violence against women and vulnerability to HIV/AIDS. This project is financed by UNIFEM, a United Nations organization that works on women's issues.
- A workshop called "Mobilizing Faith Communities Around HIV/AIDS: Addressing Critical Issues," was created and held with Lutheran churches and ecumenical groups, reaching nearly 576 people from Santiago and the southern regions of Chile.
- Workshops with poor women in the city of Concepción on HIV/AIDS prevention reached over 1,183 women and health care workers in the region.
- The implementation of two projects directed at community organizations called "Promoting Health Rights," financed a total of 19 health projects, and reached 4,790 people in Concepción and 9,446 people in Santiago.
- Four workshops called "Friends, Let's Talk about Sexuality," were attended by 606 housewives and housekeepers from four cities throughout the region.
- Four workshops entitled "Citizen and Leadership Formation for Women" were led in collaboration with SERNAM Women's Ministry and The Bolivian University (Universidad Bolivariana) in the northern regions of Chile, resulting in 949 women in three cities receiving valuable information.
- EPES created a set of 13 pamphlets based on Ministry of Health research on the quality of life and health in Chile. Over 25,000 copies of these pamphlets are now being widely distributed throughout the entire country.
- EPES designed and developed five workshops that focus on the quality of care in health care facilities. More than 60 emergency-room health care workers from the largest and most important hospital in Chile are being trained in these workshops.

When Miriam first attended EPES' health promoter training in 2000, she was struggling to support her family. With an absent husband, Miriam scraped by, fixing and re-selling donated household items. After becoming a health promoter, Miriam applied her new knowledge and skills to move her own family out of the poor and unsafe neighborhood in which they lived to her own house in a safer place. Miriam then set out to help those in need, serving as a caretaker for the disabled and elderly, teaching preventive health measures, and administering medicine to sick individuals. But the most inspiring aspect of Miriam's story is her transformation into a confident, optimistic and strong woman.

There are many women who have similar stories... and even more who are waiting for their story to begin. Your gift to EPES is a long-term investment that will help many women like Miriam transform their own lives, the lives of their children and life in their communities.
